I, Mrs. F. A. Patrick do hereby make application to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for a pension, to be granted me under the Act passed by the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Texas, and approved April 7, A. D. 1913, on the following grounds:

I am the widow of Frank Abner Patrick, deceased, who departed this life on the 12 day of June, A. D. 1920, in the county of Anderson in the State of Texas

I have not remarried since the death of my said husband,* and I do solemnly swear that I was never divorced from my said husband, and that I never voluntarily abandoned him during his life, but remained his true, faithful and lawful wife up to the date of his death. I was married to him on the 21 day of January, A. D. 1869, in the county of Leon in the State of Texas

My husband, the said Frank Abner Patrick, enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that he did not desert the Confederate service. I have been a resident of the State of Texas since prior to January 1, A. D. 1910, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value above the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of one thousand dollars, exclusive of the home of the value of not over \$2000; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

3. How long have you resided in the State of Texas? 76 years
4. How long have you resided in the county of your present residence? 42 years

My dear Mr. Briggs:

I have your letter of March 23, 1926, with which you inclosed one, herewith returned, from Messrs. Cotten and McCain, Attorneys at Law, Palestine, Texas, who desire the military record of Frank Abner Patrick of Debray's Regiment, Company G, 26th Texas Cavalry, Confederate States Army.

The records show that F. A. Patrick (name not found as Frank Abner Patrick) enlisted November 9, 1862, for the period of the war, and served as a private, (2d) Company G, 26th Texas Cavalry, C.S.A., also known as Debray's Regiment Texas Cavalry. He is satisfactorily accounted for on all rolls on file to and including the one for January and February, 1864, which is the latest on file and reports him as present. No later record of him has been found.

The collection of Confederate records on file in the Department is far from complete, and failure to find the entire record of a person thereon is by no means conclusive proof that he did not serve during some period not covered by the records on file.
